We in the Church are also beginning to dream of easing 'lockdown' and despite the dreaded 'quarantine' maybe even of having some time away from it all!

I have been wondering about our **Intercultural Mass in October** and how that might work out. Originally, it was timed to co-incide with One World Week, **18 - 25 October** this year, which in turn linked to United Nations Day, 24 October. I thought we might try to arrange it to co-incide if possible, with our "Welcome" at the Cathedral for the new Eparch of the Ukrainian Greek Catholic Community, Bishop Kenneth Nowakowski.

I have asked Monsignor Timothy Menezes at St Chad's about this proposal and he is considering whether it might be possible; a lot depends on what the arrangements with regard to large Church celebrations will be, including how sharing of food can take place and so on. Then, of course, we would have to look at the date and the availability of Archbishop Bernard and Bishop Kenneth. Anyway, I wanted you to know I have been giving this some thought, and **maybe you would bear in mind that week in October, and keeping it clear if you can!**

It would be nice to have Priests from the Ethnic Chaplaincies, Eparchies and Missions involved with representation from their communities.

I have been involved with the Bridgettine Sisters in helping to arrange live streaming of the **Annual Novena of Masses leading up to the Solemnity of the Sacred Heart** at Maryvale Institute 19 June. I am attaching the list of Celebrants with the link access to the Masses, and a copy of the Novena Prayers; it would be nice if you could circulate these to your Communities. The Solemnity of the Sacred Heart is now the Annual Day of Prayer for the Sanctification of Priests.

Please note, Archbishop Bernard is marking the Pilgrimage Day on 21 June at his Mass in St Chad's Cathedral.
